New Awards September 2021

Grade I

St Paul, Halliwell, Bolton

Sarah Renn 1848 2/22 Rks NPOR ref: N10666

A very rare example. The largest surviving almost unaltered organ from the firm of Samuel Renn in his relatively conservative style. Built after his death by Kirkland & Jardine before they started their own firm.

Grade II*

St Peter, Stanton Lacey, Shropshire

Gray & Davison 1854 1/7 NPOR ref: N04775

A largely intact small organ in a pleasant case with good pipe decoration. An excellent example of the London firm of Gray & Davison in 1854, then at the height of their reputation as one of the leading organ-builders in the country.

Grade II

St John the Divine, Richmond, Surrey

Beale & Thynne 1896 3/31 NPOR ref: N13879

The unique surviving organ of the short-lived London partnership of Beale & Thynne which, although with subsequent alterations to its mechanism, retains its unusual and significant tonal design.

St Peter, Ely, Cambridgeshire

Hill 1891 1/7 NPOR ref: N03013

A well preserved small organ from 1891, the concluding period of Thomas Hill's tenure of the firm, retaining all original features of construction.

Holy Trinity, Deanshanger, Northamptonshire

Willis c.1870 1/6 NPOR ref: D03367

An interesting Scudamore organ by Henry Willis (intact apart from subsequent redecoration of the case), It demonstrates his skill at designing small instruments of tonal variety and versatility.
